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# CANOLA ACREAGE IN MINNESOTA SHOWS A 37% INCREASE

USDA's National Ag Statistics Service (NASS) Crop Production Report, which tracks yield, acreage, and production of crops, estimated a 37% increase in Minnesota's harvested canola acreage for 2024. Acres increased from 79,000 in 2023 to 108,000 in 2024, the highest since 2000 and third highest on record. Yield per acre also increased from 2,470 lbs/ac in 2023 to 2,500 lbs/ac in 2024, a 1.2% increase. Nationally, yield rose just over 1%, going from 1,763 lbs/ac in 2023 to 1,811 lbs/ac in 2024. Harvested canola acreage in the U.S. was up 17%; 2,319,200 acres in 2023 to 2,720,500 in 2024.

# 2024 CANOLA PRODUCTION CENTRE (CPC)

The 2024 Canola Production Centre (CPC) was located across from Northern Resources Co-op in Roseau, MN. Trials were spearheaded by Nancy Ehlke, Donn Vellekson, and Dave Grafstrom of the University of Minnesota and included seven different trials, all planted by May 29 (see CPC Field Day article on back).

# COUNCIL RECEIVES \$90,000 MDA AGRI CROP RESEARCH GRANT

The Council was awarded a \$90,000 grant by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's (MDA) Agricultural Growth, Research, and Innovation (AGRI) Program to study direct harvest canola strategies intended to increase harvest efficiency and profitability. Nancy Ehlke, Donn Vellekson, and Dave Grafstrom will serve as the project's lead investigators. Project objectives: 1) documenting LL and RR canola variety responses to direct harvest methods; 2) evaluating various rates, timing, and water volumes for desiccants used in direct harvest; and 3) documenting and evaluating scope of late season flea beetle damage in direct harvest canola.

# SCLEROTINIA RISK IN CANOLA FORECAST PROGRAM

The program began June 21 and ran through July. It was developed by the NDSU canola pathology program with support from the Sclerotinia Initiative, Northern Canola Growers Association, and Minnesota Canola Council. Information, based on research data, is a guide for farmers. The program has two components: 1) a general risk map; and 2) a risk calculator. The map uses weather information to estimate disease development risk and is updated daily starting mid-June. The calculator combines cultural practice information and field history of sclerotinia with weather information from the nearest NDAWN station to estimate disease risk for a specific field. *Maps were available at mncanola.org or through the NDSU Canola Doctor app available for both Android and iPhones.*

# MINNESOTA CANOLA COUNCIL JOINS AG GROUPS FOR COMMENTS ON ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT (ESA)

The Council submitted comments to EPA on the draft Herbicide Strategy Framework for ESA requirements. Framework describes analyses conducted to estimate endangered species' exposure to herbicides, assess potential impacts of pesticides, and determine mitigations necessary to protect endangered species. The strategy proposes a mitigation menu to reduce herbicide exposure to listed species from spray drift, run-off, and erosion. It identifies the geographic extent of mitigation measures and describes an implementation plan.

# **CROP INSURANCE EXPANSION**

The Council continues to work with USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA) to expand canola crop insurance coverage to the following Minnesota counties: Becker, Clay, Grant, Hubbard, Otter Tail, Stevens, Traverse, and Wilkin. The expansion of the program will give a greater number of farmers flexibility to incorporate canola into crop rotations without the added burden of going through a written agreement process. The expansion will encourage farmers in these counties to grow canola as an alternative to disease prone small grains in order to diversify rotations. All counties requested for inclusion have been included in the program previously.

# COUNCIL REPRESENTED IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Representatives of the Council attended the U.S. Canola Association's (USCA) annual meeting in Washington, D.C., March 18-20. The meeting gave canola representatives the opportunity to meet with lawmakers regarding its 2024 Federal Policy Priorities: crop insurance enhancements, including increased premium support; equitable treatment of canola in commodity programs (reference prices, loans); research funding (\$10 million NIFA-SAC, \$2.4 million sclerotinia); incorporating canola into GREET modeling to determine tax credits for biofuels; science-based regulation of pesticides by the EPA; streamlining and expanding H-2A temporary worker program; and improving the plant biotechnology regulatory framework.
